If handled properly, this sector can be a driver towards achieving middle income status by 2050 as envisioned by the EAC Development Strategy. This underscores the contribution of MSMEs towards ensuring sustainable social-economic transformation in the region from a peasant into viable and sustainable business entities capable of contributing at least 50% of GDP through manufacturing, consequently leading to a prosperous and modern community.

The main purpose of the annual exhibitions is to facilitate the formalization of informal sector activities within the East Africa region by allowing them to meet, share experience, exchange business information, and expand the markets for their products in order to exploit opportunities offered by the EAC Common Market.

These Exhibitions also helps the MSMEs to bridge the gaps in trade, culture and social economic imbalances in the region; create awareness of the sector's potential in producing and providing affordable goods to its citizens; and also create expanded investment opportunities for the regional upcoming/emerging entrepreneurs; and above all, initiate dialogue between the entrepreneurs who will share knowledge in technology and business techniques.

All this is in line with the EAC commitment to transform the regional economy through industrialization. The region's overriding objective is to create a modern, competitive and dynamic industrial sector which is fully integrated into the global economy.

Industrialisation in the context of the EAC region depends on how the region strategically leverages from the market created by the Common Market Protocol as a source or stimulus for demand, while simultaneously capitalising on opportunities created by the global as well as fast-growing emerging markets for manufactured goods. The realisation of a fully functioning Common Market and the deepening of regional integration through a monetary union are crucial for providing the much-needed impetus for industrialisation in the region.

Ladies and Gentlemen, we realise that regional integration is desirable and we cannot walk away from it. It is true even today as our founding fathers realized it when they established the EAC, that individually our countries are small and weak but collectively we can become a bigger market and a stronger entity.

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Allow me also use this opportunity to welcome our brothers and sisters from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) who were this year admitted into the EAC. This presents a massive trading opening for the EAC as we will boost our trade partners by an additional 90Million people. Growing our trade and trading partners is the direction for total independence and economic development
